“A Night Standardise a Nation”

The Sumathi Awards Ceremony, established in 1995, aims to elevate the standards of Sri Lankan teledramas, television productions, and advertisements by evaluating their quality, inspiring Sri Lankan tele-creations and the industry, and promoting Sri Lankan productions on an international stage.

The Sumathi Awards Ceremony is also the only continuously held television awards ceremony in Sri Lanka that emphasizes local culture and traditions while preserving diversity. In today's rapidly evolving technological world, local content creation reaches audiences beyond traditional television and garners significant attention through social media.

As a result, expanding beyond the categories awarded in previous years, this year's ceremony will also present awards dedicated to social media.

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Retrospection of a Magnificent Beginning

The date was November 25, 1995. That evening, the Sugathadasa Indoor Stadium in Colombo was filled to capacity with over six thousand attendees. Everyone had gathered to witness an awards ceremony unlike any they had seen before. Inspired by the Nissanka Latha Mandapaya, built during the Polonnaruwa era by King Keerthi Sri Nissankamalla, a grand and majestic stage designed by veteran artist Wimal Jayawardena captivated the eyes and hearts of all present.

That was the inaugural Sumathi Awards ceremony. Even before the event officially



began, the audience, enchanted by the surrounding splendour and the beautifully adorned stage, recognized one clear fact: this magnificent awards ceremony would not be a one-time event, but one that would continue for decades, uplifting Sri Lankan arts. The hopes and wishes of those who witnessed that first Sumathi Awards ceremony have been fulfilled. Today, we celebrate three decades of the Sumathi Awards and gather to honour that enduring legacy.

Three decades is indeed a long time. During this period, not only the Sri Lankan arts sector but the entire nation



its core values-a truly remarkable journey witnessed by many citizens of this country.

The Sumathi Awards were initiated based on a concept by Mr. Thilanga Sumathipala, then Managing Director of Lakkima Newspaper Company. His intention was to launch a cultural festival reflecting Sinhala culture and upholding artistic and aesthetic quality.

From the very beginning, Dr. Milina Sumathipala-who made significant contributions to cinema through artistically valuable films such as *Ganga Addara*, *Duwata Mawaka Misa*, *Uppalavanna*, and *Paththini-*

along with other members of the Sumathipala family, consistently appreciated artistic and aesthetic expression, offering their blessings and support to the Sumathi Awards.

By 1995, television had become a highly popular and accessible medium among the public, yet the creative productions broadcast through it, and the artists contributing to them, were not given due recognition. The Sumathi Awards were established to fill this gap.

However, the awards had another purpose beyond honouring outstanding figures in the arts: they aimed to provide guidance to ensure proper standards in television productions. Today, as the awards celebrate three decades, the Sumathi Awards are recognized as a benchmark for artistic excellence.

The stage administration of the inaugural event, which left an unforgettable impression on audiences, was managed by the esteemed Kala Suri Sathischandra Edirisinghe. The original trophy design was created by Mr. Owen Weerakkody of the National Youth Services Council, based on a concept by Mr. Thilanga Sumathipala.

Among the various mass communication media in Sri Lanka, television holds the position as the most popular and influential. Thanks to long-term strategic decisions, television was introduced to Sri Lanka in 1979 and quickly secured a leading role in the country's media landscape.

On February 15, 1982, under the Sri Lanka Television Corporation Act No. 06 of 1982, national television broadcasting officially began. Since then, television has served as a powerful and beloved medium in the country. Following its introduction, one of the most cherished programs among Sri Lankans became teledramas. These dramas, with their ability to subtly touch individual emotions and act as potent tools for social critique, reveal not only society's true nature but also the authentic self of individuals.

Initially, teledramas in Sri Lanka focused primarily on entertainment. The very first teledrama broadcast was *Dimuthu*

Muthu, directed by Mr. D. B. Nihalsingha. Despite many challenges over the years, Sri Lankan teledramas have steadily progressed, embracing new technologies and evolving significantly.

The Sumathi Awards ceremony, established in 1995, has become the grand cultural celebration of Sri Lanka's small screen. It is a platform that not only appreciates the acting talents of Sri Lankan artists but also serves as a prestigious event eagerly anticipated by creators across the television industry, all hoping to receive recognition for their work.

Sustaining the Sumathi Awards for thirty continuous years while upholding true excellence in television production has been a challenging task. Overcoming these challenges, the ceremony has proudly endured for three decades, playing a vital role in honoring and uplifting the legacy of Sri Lankan visual arts. Today, we celebrate this remarkable achievement with great pride and joy.

Awards That Shape the Direction of the Arts

Awards represent certificates of standards granted by authoritative bodies, recognizing the quality relationship between audiences and artistic creations. More than that, awards act as powerful rudders guiding the vast vessel of art. At times, they influence not only the course of art itself but also the individual journeys of those within it. In essence, awards have the power to shape creative direction and personal paths alike.

When examined closely, six key criteria typically determine the excellence of any awards ceremony:

- The nature of the jury and the quality of their decisions
- Well-structured and regularly updated award categories and evaluation criteria
- Recognition and respect within the industry and broader society
- Meaningful and positive impact on both the community and the field
- Organized with excellence and effectiveness
- Number of editions held and continuity of the event

When the distinguished artist Jackson Anthony once received an award, he said on stage:

“An award is an encouragement...!”

An encouragement that is never restrictive...!”

He emphasized that this encouragement must be given in the right measure, at the right time, in the right manner, for the right cause, and to the right person a responsibility that the awards jury cannot neglect. Likewise, recipients must take responsibility to use this encouragement properly and wisely. After all, what they receive is the best award of the year, not the best award of all time.

The heart of any awards ceremony is the jury, while the brain is the pre-selection committee. An awards ceremony fundamentally depends on the decisions of its jury. A single incorrect decision or flawed criterion can misdirect the entire event, risking its credibility. Therefore, the accuracy and soundness of the jury's decisions are crucial.

It is natural for opinions to differ regarding the jury's decisions, as qualitative judgment is subjective and relative to each individual's perspective.

The pre-selection process evaluates the success achieved when artists or technical experts confidently direct their skills

toward their vision. Awards answer questions such as: In which direction have we travelled within the arts? Where are we heading? Where should we be moving?

By recognizing the highest standards of artistry, awards raise the minimum standards within the field. They should also encourage and appreciate new trends. A recent example is the Sumathi Tele Awards' recognition last year of the mini-series format, which inspired many high-quality, creatively excellent mini-series productions demonstrating how awards can shape artistic directions. Well-defined and systematic evaluation criteria are powerful factors in raising standards, providing artists with clear goals especially important for emerging talents.

Jury members and organizers should acknowledge global trends and locally relevant innovations to modernize domestic awards. This investment is crucial for the future of the arts. For instance, if categories such as Best Titling, Best Title Design, Best Casting, and Best Trailer were introduced in upcoming years, it would represent significant progress for national awards ceremonies. Notably, the international Oscars introduced a Best Casting award starting in 2025, reflecting such global standards.

In my personal observation, the recommendations for the main categories in the 2024 Sumathi Tele Awards Best Actress, Best Screenplay, Best Direction, and Best Television Drama were 100% accurate, a highly commendable feature of this year's ceremony.

The 2024 Sumathi Awards were notably competitive compared to previous years. Of the seven outstanding television productions that aired in 2024 Take Care, Wiyali, Backside, Thapparayak Denna, Susum Rasthiyaduwa, Chandi Kumarihami, and Mee Massa six were nominated this year. This

inclusion of almost all top productions significantly intensified the competition. A victory earned through fierce competition against strong contenders holds greater value than one achieved in a weaker field or by default. Accordingly, the prestige of this year's Sumathi Awards is undeniably high.

For example, the Best Actress category featured a decisive competition like never before. Actresses Rebecca Dilrukshi, Chandani Senavirathna, Tharindi Fernando, and Dinakshi Priyasad each delivered outstanding and distinctive performances. Their character development, supported by excellent scriptwriting and direction, was a major factor intensifying the competition. The jury deserves honourable appreciation for their intelligent and precise selection of nominees. The decision to nominate four actresses instead of the usual three further highlights the exceptional competitiveness in this category.

Finally, I respectfully urge all nominees and winners this year to reflect on the nominees and winners of previous years. Such reflection will provide valuable insight into the prestige and evolving standards of the award category.

The Sumathi Tele Award you are about to receive is uniquely and brilliantly crafted, honoured by the touch of many great creative masters. When you receive this award, remember you bear the immense responsibility of upholding and nurturing art that is both high in quality and beloved by the public.





Since that day, I have been a permanent member of the Sumathi Awards in various capacities. Except for two or three occasions when I was out of the country, I have never missed the Sumathi Awards. The Sumathi Awards Ceremony is not merely an event that honours the theatrical talents of Sri Lankan artists; it is also a prestigious platform that provides every creator in the television industry with an opportunity to receive due recognition for their work over the course of a year. Marking three decades of pride, the 30th edition of the Sumathi Awards, renowned as the “Grand Celebration of Excellence on the Small Screen”, will evaluate and honour television productions broadcast between January 1, 2024, and December 31, 2024, along with the artists who contributed to these works.

Concept

In accordance with the noble vision of Mr. Thilanga Sumathipala, the Sumathi Awards Ceremony has been held continuously since 1995 to celebrate true excellence in television production. All awards are selected by an independent panel of Judges, which consists of senior, impartial experts in the field who contribute their invaluable expertise. A unique feature of the Sumathi Awards is the recognition not only of actors and actresses but also of everyone behind the scenes who contributes significantly to every

production on the small screen. Accordingly, annually approximately 60 awards are given categories covering a broad spectrum, including cinematography, directing, production, music direction, costume design, art direction, lighting, as well as news direction, reporting, investigative journalism, television presenting, advertising, and social media content creation.

Purpose

The primary purpose of the Sumathi Awards is to elevate the standards of Sri Lankan teledramas, television productions, and advertisements by evaluating their quality, to inspire Sri Lankan tele-creations and the industry, and to promote Sri Lankan productions on an international stage. To achieve this, the awards continuously emphasize local culture and traditions while preserving Sri Lankan identity, and are held annually without interruption. As a result, the Sumathi Awards have become a prestigious event widely respected both locally and internationally. In a rapidly evolving technological world, local content creation is now reaching audiences beyond traditional television, gaining significant attention through social media and as a result, expanding beyond the number of categories awarded in previous years, this year's Ceremony will also present awards dedicated to social media.

Performers of the Awards Ceremony

To deliver a spectacular, internationally acclaimed awards ceremony to the audience,

the 30th Sumathi Awards collaborate with several key organizations and individuals: Showtown Entertainment (BNS), led by Bhatia Santhush, provides technical and entertainment support; Ants @ Work handles program coordination; Channa Upali Dance Academy presents the dance performances; and the musical orchestra is led by Manoj Peiris. Moreover, Saliya Weerasekara manages the event logistics, Santhus Weeraman handles digital marketing, and Srimal Wimalaratne oversees the LED panels and lighting, all contributing to making the Sumathi Awards stage vibrant and impressive.

Best Awards

All telecasted productions, teledramas (series and single episodes) and programs representing various genres, that aired across all Sri Lankan television channels between January 1 and December 31 2024, will be subject to careful evaluation. Final decisions on Best Awards will be made by an independent panel of judges renowned for their refined taste, aesthetic sensibility, and technical expertise.

Popular Awards

The most captivating and prestigious highlight of the Sumathi Awards is undoubtedly the “Audience Choice Awards”, presented under the three most popular categories: Most Popular Actor, Most Popular Actress, and Most Popular Teledrama. Likewise, a special new award category has been introduced this year, based on a proposal made by heads of media institutions. That is the Sumathi Award presented for the Most Popular Television Programme. Among the teledramas currently being aired on all channels, the nominated names for the most popular actor, actress, and teledrama have been included for this purpose and the names relevant to the programs have been nominated exclusively by the television channels.

Information related to the Popular Category can be accessed by anyone through the official Sumathi Awards Facebook page. SMS voting and online voting for the Popular Awards can be done via the official Sumathi Awards website: www.sumathiawards.lk. Likewise, Sri Lankan fans living abroad will also have the opportunity to cast their votes via the Sumathi Awards official website and all voting results and updates related to the awards ceremony will be announced through the Sumathi Awards Facebook page and the official website www.sumathiawards.lk.

Digital Media Awards

At the 30th prestigious Sumathi Awards, one of the most significant new additions this year is the Digital Media Awards category. This marks a fresh inclusion under the popular awards segment of the Sumathi Awards.

In addition, this year the Digital Awards category has been expanded to recognize excellence across a broader range of content. The Sumathi Digital Awards are designed to recognize the ever-evolving media landscape and the diverse digital platforms emerging around it, encouraging progress and innovation.

Sumathipala Memorial Award 2025**

Sunil Edirisinghe

Born on the 19th of December, 1949, in the village of Hungamugoda in Kelaniya, he received his early education at Varagoda D. B. Jayathilaka Vidyalaya and later at the Dharmaloka College, Kelaniya.

From a very young age, he displayed remarkable vocal talent and, introduced to Dr. Victor Rathnayake by his elder brother, the renowned artist Sathischandra Edirisinghe, he won the nation's hearts overnight by singing the playback song "Sandakada Pahanaaka Ketyam Opala," with music directed by Victor Rathnayake, featured in the 1973 film Mathara Achchi.

He further refined his singing skills under the guidance of the music maestro P.V. Nandasiri and, in 1973, went to India to pursue advanced studies in music.

His songs "Kuda Game Maddahane" from the film Hulawali and "Hise Gini Avilethe" from the film Sri Madara stand out as significant milestones in his singing career.

"Vadakayanane Oba Sitharaya" was the first light classic he sang, and he was ranked as an outstanding vocalist during a radio audition conducted by the Indian musician Deepal Nag. His vocal talent was accolade through awards such as Sarasaviya, Presidential, and Swarna Sankha honours.

Starting with Anand Samarakkone, Sunil Santha, and Pandith Amaradeva, and following greats like Professor Sanath Nandasiri and Dr. Victor Rathnayake, he developed in the 1980s with a calm, soulful voice rising from his own spirituality. Shouldn't we remember that he elevated the song beyond true love, transforming it into a social mission that enriches the listener's wisdom, as he sang the tribute song titled "Rangana Narthana Tharanga Sarasē" at the Sumathi Awards ceremony? His melodious voice also blended beautifully in numerous television dramas. The Sumathipala Memorial Award, bestowed only once in a lifetime in memory of the late U. W. Sumathipala, founder of the Sumathi Group, and Madam Milina Sumathipala will be presented at the 30th Sumathi




Presented only once in a lifetime **Sumathipala Memorial Award 2025**

Veena Jayakody

Virginia Sandhya Peiris, born on November 27, 1952, as the second daughter of renowned actress and director Rohini Jayakody, entered the world of acting by inheritance and made her screen debut at just three months old, portraying a baby in the 1954 film Ahankara Sthree. Her uninterrupted engagement in the field of acting from such a tender age to the present day is, in itself, worthy of recognition perhaps even a Guinness World Record.

She received her education at Anula Vidyalaya, Nugegoda, and the Good Shepherd Convent, Kotahena, and during her school years, she dreamt of becoming a flight attendant. While studying at the Holy Family Convent in Bambalapitiya, she developed an interest in acting after performing in the stage drama *Kundala Keshi*, an interest that was further inspired when she saw her elder sister, Nirupa Jayakody, acting in the film *Hangi Hora*.

In 1969, she appeared in a dancing act together with Vinee Ranwala in the film Kohomada Wade during a scene of the stage play Wana Kusa Pabawathi, having studied dance under the guidance of Sirimathi Rasadari. Her first adult role was in the Tamil-language Sri Lankan film Pudhiya Kooriru. Her breakthrough came when she met the legendary actor Gamini Fonseka at a film festival, who introduced her to the lead role in Apsara. And he became her mentor in cinema. Films such as Sarungale, Mayurige Kathawa, Sāgarayak Māda, Bandura Mal, Rā Manamāli, Kelimadala, Māruthaya, Surabidena, and Sāvitrīgē Rāthriya stand as powerful examples of her versatile acting. A recipient of Sarasavi, Presidential, Swarna Sankha, and OCIC awards, she has portrayed characters of great emotional depth at times a woman burdened by sorrow, at others a symbol of passionate love, and often a playful, light-hearted lover consistently delivering profound justice to her roles as a fully-fledged character actress, capable of embodying diverse roles with authenticity and depth.

Before entering cinema, where she combined television acting through dramas such as "Aththa Bindeyi," "Kande Gedara," "Doo Daruwo," "Menik Nadiya Gala Basi," and "Sura Asura," she changed her original name, Virginia Sandhya Peiris, to "Veena Jayakody" based on the suggestion of her own mother.

The Sumathipala Memorial Award, bestowed only once in a lifetime in memory of the late U. W. Sumathipala, founder of the Sumathi Group, and Madam Milina Sumathipala will be presented at the 30th Sumathi Awards to veteran Actress Veena Jayakody, who has dedicated 70 years to the Cinema industry.

He has served with distinction as the Head of the Department of Dance and Drama at the University of the Visual and Performing Arts, Colombo, Director of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, and Chairman of the Sri Lanka Arts Council,



which comprises twelve sub-councils, among many other prestigious positions. He is the first Sri Lankan performing artist to obtain a doctoral degree through research brought before a distinguished academic panel, specializing in a diverse range of artistic disciplines including music, photography, acting, folk language, culture, rural drama, theatre, teledrama, and cinema. He holds the distinction of being the first performing artist in Sri Lanka to be conferred a professorship in the field of dance.

Chair Senior Professor Dr. Upul Ranjith Hewawithanagama

Senior Professor Dr. Upul Ranjith Hewawithanagama, has obtained Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Hindi Language and Literature from the University of Kelaniya and Master of Philosophy (MPhil) and later earned his Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) degree from Jawaharlal Nehru University in Delhi. Additionally, he pursued Hindustani classical music and obtained the Vādhya Vishārada degree from Bhatkhande Music Institute. Upul Ranjith is an award-winning writer and translator, honoured with the State Literary Award for his contributions to literature. Retrospect from the 30th Awards Ceremony

The Sumathi Tele Drama Awards Night, recognized as Sri Lanka's prestigious television awards ceremony, is a spectacular event where brilliant stars of the arts bloom and shine brightly, creating a truly magnificent spectacle. This is the retrospect held upon the heartfelt admiration of devoted art lovers, this awards ceremony, now a gracious young adult after spanning three decades. The influence exerted by Sri Lankan television media on the development of Sri Lankan social science is a cultural interaction that spans a wide spectrum. How delightful that this is the, Asia's first teledrama awards ceremony, recognizes and honors artists who have brought new light to television media by thoughtfully and critically observing the natural talents and diverse skills of local teledrama and television creators!

On June 5, 1979, Sri Lanka was introduced to the electronic medium called "television" and four years later, in 1983, the teledrama 'Dimuthu Muthu', directed by the veteran cinema and teledrama director D. B. Nihalsingha, marked the beginning of teledrama history not only in Sri Lanka but throughout Asia. Twelve years after the emergence of the first teledrama mentioned above, the Sumathi Tele Drama Awards ceremony was inaugurated in 1995 to honour teledrama artists and this historic event is recognized as, Asia's first-ever teledrama awards ceremony.

More than four decades have passed since the first teledrama emerged, and during this time, the evolutionary development of teledrama as a visual art form has become firmly and prominently intertwined with the characteristics of the television industry, which we must acknowledge. The teledrama, as an electronic storytelling medium, became popular in society and incorporated artistic features, utilizing both visual and auditory elements, adapting itself to Sri Lankan socio culture. In such a context, holding an awards ceremony like this is not only an appreciation for maintaining standards in television media and promoting its positive social integration into Sri Lankan culture but also a significant and fruitful effort requiring dedication, courage, and commitment.

Generally, a notable characteristic observed in teledramas is the special focus given to new themes and concepts that present fresh perspectives, achieved through considerable effort in creative formats, while transcending traditional 'themes' rooted in Sri Lankan social institutions. Just as popular factors, quality factors, commercial dominance, channel ownership based on competition, and industry characteristics influence programming, hasn't the television audience today become passive and somewhat resistant? Therefore, organizing such an evaluation ceremony that balances the popular elements necessary

for a competitive television industry with qualitative factors and integrity is commendable. Television media continues to enjoy popularity both as a family medium and as a more reliable source of information.

Although the current situation is different, thirty years ago a young entrepreneur named Thilanga Sumathipala, despite lacking prior experience, made a pioneering effort to recognize and award artists involved in teledrama electronic broadcasting and this initiative reflects his dedication to the arts and the positive vision he and fellow artists uphold. However, it was not merely a coincidence. I assume it was the formative inspiration he received from his father, U. W. Sumathipala, a respected figure who contributed to the film industry, that led him in this direction. In later years, his mother too contributed to the film industry, and it is appropriate to recall here the silent service, dedication, and contributions made by this entrepreneurial artistic family to Sri Lanka's film industry and teledrama culture. When comparatively analyzing the various state-level award ceremonies held to honor Sri Lankan artists, it is worth exploring why we consider the 30th Sumathi Awards to be of particular significance. The State Drama Festival was initiated as early as 1959 to recognize theatrical performers, and although 66 years have passed since then (as of 2025), only 51 award ceremonies have been held. Similarly, the State Literary Awards Ceremony, which also began in 1959 to honour creative writers, has held only around 64 ceremonies over the same 66-year period. Although the State Film Awards Ceremony was initiated in 1964 to recognize artists in the film industry, only about 35 award ceremonies have been held over the 61 years since then (up to 2025). Although the first State Ballet and Dance Festival was held in 1961 to honor Sri Lankan performing artists in the field of dance, only about 14 award ceremonies have been held over the 74 years since then (as of 2025). Despite this, when

considering that Thilanga Sumathipala, a businessman with a passion for the arts, initiated a teledrama awards ceremony in 1995 and has successfully held 30 such ceremonies over the past 30 years (1995–2025), isn't that in itself a remarkable 'wonder'? The Sumathi Tele Awards is a ceremony that, while preserving tradition, is organized with a contemporary understanding that embraces youthfulness and modern social dynamics. The inclusion of supporting creative streams such as graphic design, social media, and digital advertising, which have now become essential elements of modern teledrama, clearly reflects this evolution.

I deeply remember and appreciate the jury members and chairpersons who, through their accurate and fair judgments, played a crucial role in upholding the excellence of teledrama and its closely related electronic art forms over the course of 30 award ceremonies.

I also fondly remember the 51 great Sri Lankan artists who have been honoured with the Sumathipala Memorial Award over the years. This is because the Sri Lankan art field has been richly nurtured by invaluable artists who have devoted themselves boundlessly to it, contributing to the country, the nation, and the world

This is because the Sri Lankan art scene has been richly nurtured by invaluable artists who have devoted themselves boundlessly. Looking back thoughtfully from the founding year of 1995, it becomes clear that this award ceremony's creator had a distinct artistic vision, as evidenced by the recognition and honouring of monumental works, renowned creators, talented actors and actresses, skilled technical artists, expert scriptwriters, meticulous editors, and creative cinematographers, all of whom have significantly contributed their talents and skills to the Sri Lankan teledrama industry. From then until now, the Sumathi Tele Awards have recognized and honoured a vast number of distinguished artists, including acclaimed



tele-drama productions, creative directors, highly skilled actors and actresses, talented scriptwriters, single-episode and feature film works, best supporting actors and actresses, as well as emerging performers, acknowledging their outstanding contributions.

Moreover, from then until now, a majority of the artists who live in the hearts of the youth as popular teledramas and popular tele-actors and actresses have also been honoured with awards. Accordingly, the 30th Sumathi Awards ceremony will recognize art works created in the year 2024.

Accordingly, the judging panel reviewed a total of 314 programs for the awarding of more than 50 awards across various categories, including 12 teledramas, 36 single-episode/telefilms, 13 digital animations, 18 music programmes, 10 sports programmes, 23 educational programmes, 21 documentary programmes, 22 current affairs programmes, 18 magazine programmes, 10 children's programmes, 12 investigative

programmes, 15 current affairs reporting programmes, 17 presentations, 66 television news readers, 9 television news bulletins, and 11 political programs.

We do not intend, at this juncture, to offer critiques or record observations regarding the positive or negative attributes of the submitted works, nor to assess the qualities a teledrama should or should not possess, as, irrespective of the level, condition, or standard of your productions and the contributions of all involved artists, technical professionals, and the entire production team, our primary expectation from this awards ceremony is to acknowledge the extent to which these works have elevated the status, development, progress, and future prospects of the tele-industry.


